Mission Week 2025 was a wonderful opportunity for our school community to come together and renew our faith and celebrate our journeys as Pilgrims of Hope. Mission Week involved our exploration of key aspects of the St Peter's Mission via the themes of this Jubilee year; Modern Day Slavery; Food Poverty; World Debt; Forgiveness; Human Dignity; Victims of War; Rest and Worship. For example, in RE, pupils studied powerful examples of forgiveness and the importance this has in our faith. During the week, all pupils attended a special mass. The Eucharistic celebrations were a beautiful way to thank God for all the blessings we receive each day and to pray

together in thanksgiving following our patronal feast day; the Feast of St Peter and St Paul. These two pillars of the early church provide an example of spreading the Good news. Pupils also explored four Saints who will be patrons of our new houses next year: St Francis of Assisi, St Teresa of Calcutta, St Josephine Bakhita and the soon to be Saint Carlo Acutis; four individuals who really demonstrated the Gospel in their deeds as well as words; an example to us all.

The Sunday Gospels in this period of ordinary time, have been timely, remembering Jesus sending out the disciples to spread the Good News. We are all called to do this as Pilgrims of Hope. 16 pupils accompanied Ms Keane, Ms McGrady and Mr Williams on a special pilgrimage to Knock, Ireland last weekend. They were very much Pilgrims of Hope during their weekend pilgrimage as they assisted pilgrims at the shrine which remembers when Our Lady, St Joseph and St John appeared to the faithful in Ireland back in 1879. Poignantly, the pupils, known as VAKS (Volunteers at Knock Shrine), supported the clergy in the anointing of the sick in the Basilica, an absolute honour.

A piece of scripture that pilgrims heard many times in Knock was "come to me all you who are weary and I will give you rest". As we come to the end of the school year, this will be true of the hardworking pupils and staff of St Peter's, but as we place our good work and deeds in the hands of our Lord for this year, we faith-filled children of God know that he will give us rest during our forthcoming summer break. We will keep in our prayers all those travelling over the summer and remember especially pupils waiting for examination results.

Healthcare Heroes

A group of year 9 boys attended the "Healthcare Heroes" trip at the University of Birmingham, aimed at challenging the stereotype around men working in healthcare. The boys had a fantastic hands-on experience, meeting local practitioners and members of the medical team in the army. The boys learnt the basics of first aid, applying CPR whilst receiving a really mindful insight into life in the armed forces and the experiences of the working army. They had a first-hand look at real in use army ambulances, before learning about tourniquets, how to heal a gun wound and sterile wraps. The boys then had the chance to experience a simulation activity, working as a team to deliver first aid in critical warzone situations. The session finished with a Q&A from working medics, retelling stories of places they have visited and the vital work they do overseas to teach civilians first aid, along with real combat stories which was thoroughly engaging. St Peter's First Ever Pilgrimage to Knock – A Journey of Faith and Service

We were thrilled to embark on our very first pilgrimage to Knock, Co. Mayo, with our Year 9 and Year 10 pupils. As part of the VAKs programme at the Knock Shrine, our pupils volunteered through the Youth Ministry, supporting and guiding pilgrims, and assisting priests during the Anointing of the Sick.

Throughout the pilgrimage, our pupils immersed themselves in the spiritual life of the Shrine — attending Mass, participating in the rosary and confessions, and exploring the rich history of Knock and 1830s Ireland through a fascinating tour and museum visit.

Faith, fun, and friendship were at the heart of our journey. The pupils bonded over games, reflections, and shared experiences, deepening their connection with each other and with Christ. Our accommodation in the modern onsite pods was a real highlight!

We continued our pilgrimage in Westport with a visit to Croagh Patrick and the poignant Famine Memorial, before wrapping up with a well-earned treat at Supermacs.

A heartfelt thank you to the Knock Youth Ministry for their warm hospitality and to our dedicated staff. We are so proud of our incredible pupils — they truly shone throughout the trip.

Our pupils performed in the B2 space at the Belgrade Theatre, presenting two original pieces of physical theatre developed in school especially for the event. Their energy, creativity, and teamwork were outstanding, and they received excellent feedback from the Highly Sprung team and audience members alike.

In addition to performing, pupils took part in professional workshops led by acclaimed theatre companies Fourth Monkey and Vamos Theatre. These sessions gave them a taste of industry-level training and allowed them to develop their skills in physical theatre, mask work, and ensemble performance.

It was a memorable and inspiring experience for all involved, and a brilliant celebration of what young performers can achieve when they are given the space to collaborate, take creative risks, and share their voices.

Mission Week

As part of our Mission Week celebrations the Personal Development team invited a number of outside agencies into St Peter's. Andy and Jordan from Epic Solutions made a huge impact on staff and on our year 9 and 10 pupils in the workshops focussed on gambling and gaming related harm. In addition, Year 9 had the pleasure of workshops with VR headsets run by West Midlands Police on the dangers of knife crime and safety on our streets - this was such fun but with a very serious message. We were also joined by Resus Responders for the second year running, who taught basic first aid skills to our year 7 and KS5 pupils - such an important life skill for all of our pupils to have. Year 8 were entertained by Joel with live music courtesy of the Prime Agency and discussed important topics such as bullying and mental health awareness.



50th Celebration Mass

On Monday 30th June, the day after the feast of St Peter and St Paul, Bishop David Evans joined the St Peter's community to celebrate a very special Mass of Thanksgiving. This mass celebrated 50 years of Catholic Education at St Peter's. Many current pupils and staff were joined by former pupils, parents and staff including the last two Headteachers, Mrs Murphy who retired in 2022 and Mrs McGarry who retired in 2014. 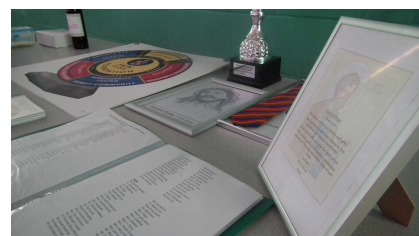

Today we offer a copy of that Bede Roll knowing that our dearly departed are always close to our hearts."

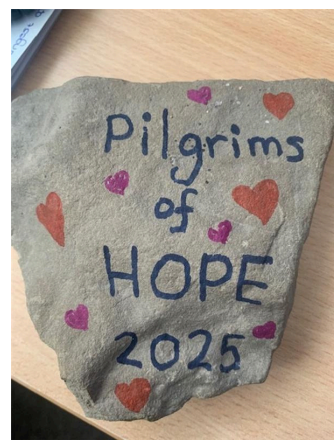


Care for God's Creation

During the Year 5 Computing Event hosted by us for our local primary schools, there were lots of activities for the children to do. We had Binary Bingo (a bingo activity utilising binary code), computing trivia on Roblox and 'Who shot Mr Burns' (a murder mystery case by solving different algorithms). All of these tasks helped the Year 5s in a multitude of computing skills which can be used in the future when coming to secondary school. The children were very engaged with the activities, worked well as a team and overall listened and understood the main concepts of computing. The Y5s worked independently in creating their own cipher wheels and took them home having learnt that computing algorithms can also be adapted to everyday situations. One of these is the magic card trick, where the children used an algorithm of different steps to reach a solution of completing the trick. Similarly, creating an algorithm for baking a cake, where the order of instructions is crucial to create a delicious treat. The children were grateful and respectful to the Year 9s, Year 10s and computing staff, thanking them after every task. Altogether, the Year 5s were very enthusiastic given that they were learning new skills in Computer Science but experiencing it in an interactive and exciting way.

Childnet Film Awards Winners!

They submitted a film about the dangers of online scams and attended screenings of the finalists' work with Mrs Lakin and Miss Moscatiello. The competition was sourced, entered and the film produced independently by the three girls and the finalists were judged by attendees from Disney, BBC, BAFTA and the BBFC. Childnet released the following press release after the event:

St Peter's Catholic School in Solihull placed first in the Secondary category of 11-18 year old entrants, with their film "This is not your fault". This film shows the emotional impact of a scam through powerful music and camera shots. We learn how important it is to be there for our friends and to get support if you need it.

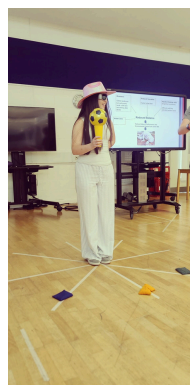


Hands-On Healthcare Experience

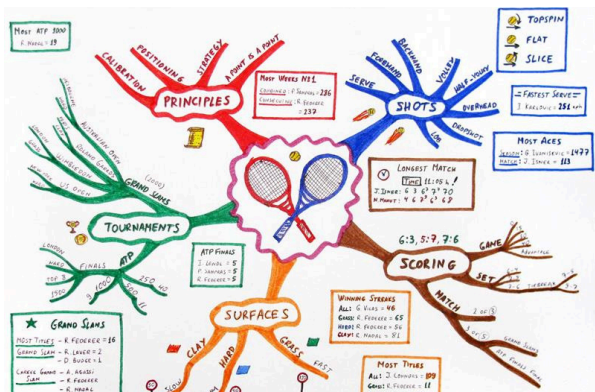

Launch into Year 11 Parent information evening

It was great to see over 200 in attendance for the launch into Year 11 parent information evening. Parents were provided with information about revision and the importance of looking after mental health during the season of GCSEs examinations. Key revision strategies were shared, notably the Leitner system for flashcards, blurring, mind maps and spaced repetition. Pupils are encouraged to make use of the revision booklet and information from Directors of Learning, including links to revision guides and useful websites. These were emailed out to parents after the event. Mr Stowe also provided a reminder about the impact of attendance and punctuality: excellent punctuality and attendance has a direct correlation with excellent exam results. We also encourage pupils to utilise every opportunity to attend after school intervention sessions – letters inviting pupils to these will be shared in the first week back in September. The key message is that success is a partnership between school, pupils and parents and we look forward to working with all Year 11s next year to achieve their potential.

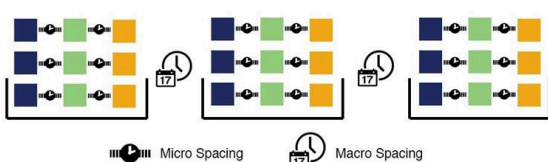

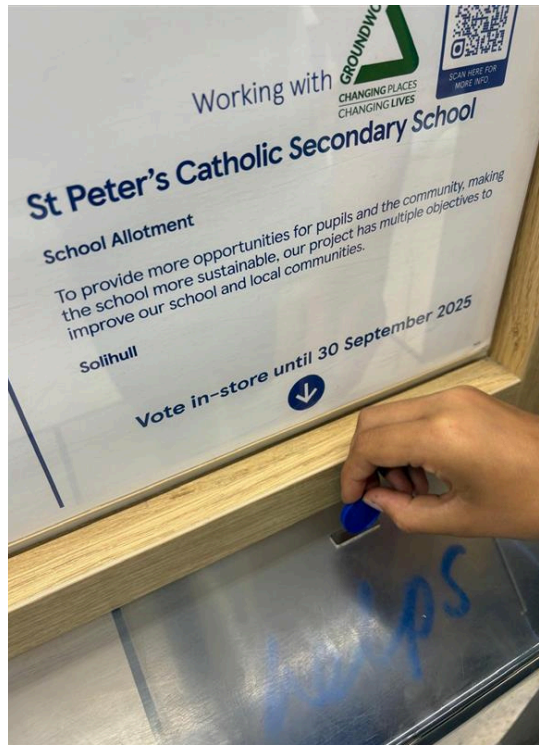
We're thrilled to announce that St Peter's Allotment has been selected for the Tesco Blue Token Community Grant Scheme, running from 1st July to September!

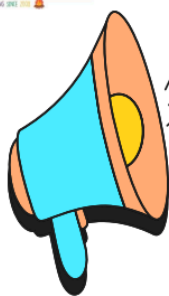
